NEW PRE-NET FORMAT

There has been a new pre-net procedure put in place in response to a request made buy a net that meets on 3.922 at 4 p.m. eastern time. (see below)

Hello folks on 3921 from the 4 Pmrs on 3922. I'm Al, K1YOT, net manager. We've noticed for some time that you folks are now on when we're on, unlike prior times. Seems that you may have changed your net time from 5 to 4. While we still can run our net, some are very aware of the qrm from some of you, perhaps those with amps. It would be greatly appreciated if either some could cut their power or the net go back to its 5pm time. The 4Pmrs have been around since 1970 and know your net has been on a long time as well. We'd appreciate any means of resolving the qrm issue if at all possible.

I responded to Al right away and informed him it was our pre-net they were hearing, and we had not changed the net time. I then sent his email to Aileen so she could consider what changes, if any should be made in the pre-net format. She came up with an idea on how to handle it and sent it to me. I then sent her an idea I had, then she made a decision. The new format for the pre-net is:

- 1. The pre-net will start at 4:30 p.m. EST.
- 2. The pre-net controls will take checkins, but will not run thru the list and have everyone make a transmission.
- 3. The pre-net controls should ask for checkins every 5 minutes and just give the stations a number.
- 4. If someone is checking in and out they can make a <u>short</u> transmission to the group.
- 5. If someone wants to talk with another station they can give them a call and have a short conversation, say 30 seconds. If they want to talk longer they should move off to another clear frequency.
- 6. The above does not apply to the Sunday Noon net.

I think this problem has arisen due to changes in propagation. When we get closer to spring the problem may go away. At that time a decision can be made

if the net wants to make any changes again. I do think there is a good chance the problem will recur next year.

I sent Al the new pre-net format and below is the response from Al, the net manager

Wisconsin FT8 Enthusiast Completes DXCC on New Mode

Denny Berg, WB9MSM, of Watertown, Wisconsin, reports that he achieved his goal of completing DXCC on December 31, 2017, using the new FT8 digital mode. It took him just 4 months.

"I can tell all of you that this mode is spreading like wildfire throughout all the HF bands," Berg told <u>The Daily DX</u>. "I have also noticed that most of these FT8ers use Logbook of The World (<u>LoTW</u>) for their confirmation process."

Berg, an ARRL member, said his current DXCC count stands at 104 entities, all confirmed via LoTW. He said he was able to work all states on FT8 in about 6 weeks of operating. A radio amateur since 1970, Berg was among the stations activating W1AW/9 from Wisconsin during the ARRL Centennial in

DPØGVN WSPR Beacon in Antarctia is Operational

On January 15 in the afternoon hours, the multiband receiver of the new permanent WSPR beacon DPØGVN in Antarctica was put into operation. It is active from the German research station "Neumayer III" of the Alfred Wegener Institute for Polar and Marine Research. The installation is part of a scientific project of the Technical University of Munich in cooperation with the University of Bremen and the German Amateur Radio Club (DARC).

The beacon is still under test and will be shut down occasionally for more configuration and optimization of antennae and software before it can be mounted to the final installation site in a few eeks. Currently, there are three radio specialists at the research station, all beeing HAM operators and DARC members (Felix DL₅XL, Matthias DH₅CW, and Daniel, DL₁SU).

The technology used consists of a WSPR multiband receiver based on a Red Pitaya mini computer, it can simultaneously monitor up to eight HAM bands from 160m to 6m and feed several hundred receive reports per hour into the WSPR-Net. Meanwhile, the 5 Watt multiband transmitter has also been commissioned, working into a 5m Procom vertical antenna matched with a network.

The first operating results have positively surprised all project participants. After a few days in service, DPØGVN has received several thousand beacons spots already. This is due to an extremely quiet location, far from any human civilization and man-made noise sources. The beacon project in Antarctica was initiated by two professors, who are also radio amateurs. One is Prof. Dr. med. Ulrich Walter, DG1KIM, scientific astronaut of the ESA and professor of space technology at the Technical University of Munich. Also involved is the well-known SDR specialist Prof.Dr. Michael Hartje, DK5HH, from the University of Bremen, who takes care of the software solutions.

The DARC is closely involved in the project, as the worldwide community of radio amateurs allows a "swarm project" in order to generate the database for systematic scientific evaluation of the propagation paths in polar regions. The devices for this scientific project were built by a group of volunteer German radio amateurs.
